### Public Education Week

You may have noticed some decorative changes to our school's front foyer and front entrance. We are continually appraising and improving our learning spaces. This reflects the first and fourth goals of the ACT Education Directorate's strategic plan... *'school is a place where students love to learn' and 'learning culture'*. In this 2019 ACT Public Education Week, our school leaders have been appraising, straightening, sorting and displaying to ensure we are creating spaces designed to welcome and engage our children in their learning and promoting the development of quality relationships with our families. This week, we have also met with members of our school community to consult about the ways we are developing our school's positive culture. Saturday's Federal Election brought locals and visitors to Macgregor Primary's hall and front entrance area...we overheard many conversations between voters making comment on our beautiful front foyer facilities and many conversations thanking our P&C team for their hospitality.

### NAPLAN

Over the last two weeks, our students in years 3 and 5 participated in NAPLAN. Students were assessed in reading, writing, language conventions and numeracy. NAPLAN is just one set of data we collect and monitor, to inform us about student progress at Macgregor Primary School. We analyse and use a range of data sets to triangulate and understand each child's learning story and this information assists us to identify the next episodes of learning. We are very proud of each student that attends our school and believe strongly in valuing a growth mindset for students and staff... 'learn hard and get smart', 'learning is not an option at Macgregor Primary School' as well as the importance of 'yet', were strong elements of my address to the children at last Friday's assembly.

### Semester 1 Student Reports

Teachers are currently preparing school reports for students in Kindergarten to Year 6 using our new online administration system. The new reports are being trialled in just some schools this semester across the ACT Education Directorate. You would have noticed from the information provided in last fortnight's newsletter, that the actual report format looks different to our previous Macgregor Primary reports. The new format reflects the way in which teachers have been planning, delivering learning programs and assessing using the Achievement Standards from the Australian Curriculum. Reports and student portfolios will be distributed on Tuesday 25 June with parent teacher interviews planned for the afternoon/evening of Wednesday 3 July. ## Spotlight on Learning 2HD

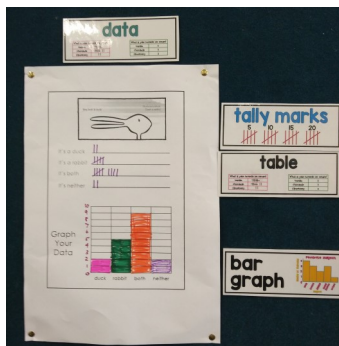
### WRITING

We have been working hard writing sentences, making sure that they make sense, are interesting for our readers and are correctly punctuated. After each writing lesson, we self-check our work, and then read it to a partner. We use our red pens to make any changes and we don't rub out any of our writing. It is important to just put a neat line through any mistakes because we know it is what good writers do and it helps us and our teachers to see our thinking.

### MATHS

In maths this term, we have been working on time and statistics, as well as keeping up with strategies for addition and subtraction. A lot of our maths is hands on using various items to help us understand how numbers can be split and combined. We can then use that understanding to help us solve addition and subtraction problems using mental computation.



We are really enjoying collecting information to answer questions such as:

What is 2HD's favourite breakfast? (Pancakes)

What is the most common number of syllables in 2HD names? (2)

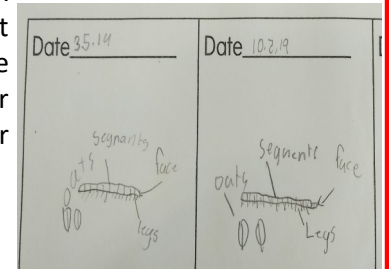
What is 2HD's favourite season? (Summer)

We are starting to come up with our own questions, collecting the data and creating graphs in our maths books using a ruler. We have all found that ruling a straight line with a ruler takes some practice!



### SCIENCE

Our science unit is all about living things and how they change and grow. We are learning about how we have changed since we were babies. Everyone is conducting an investigation into what happens to the growth of plants when we change the amount of light they receive. We have also started observing the growth of meal worms and have been excited to see how they have changed. A mealworm is the larval stage of an insect, that hatches from an egg, but we don't know yet what type of insect it is, or what it will look like in its adult stage. We made some predictions and are waiting patiently to see what will happen. So far they have shed their exoskeletons and become a little bigger. We record our observations each week using labelled drawings to show any changes.



### ICT

We love Friday afternoon coding sessions in 2HD. We are developing our understanding of programming concepts including sequencing, loops, events and investigating different problem solving techniques. We are beginning to understand that a computer will only do what we ask it to do, nothing more, nothing less. So if it isn't doing what we want, it means there is something wrong in our program. It takes persistence and resilience!

On Wednesday of this week, Macgregor Primary School participated in the National Simultaneous Storytime for 2019. It's an annual event where schools and libraries all around Australia read the same story at the same time. This year's book is: *Alpacas with Maracas* by Matt Cosgrove. It was a lot of fun as I streamed a live reading across the school to the classrooms where teachers followed up with a book-related activity.

And finally, every now and then we take the time to consider the many benefits of reading aloud to children at school and at home. Increased comprehension, improved listening skills, broadening of vocabulary and increased achievement in every subject area to name a few. Parents can help by regularly reading aloud to their children at home. Of course, there is a skill to reading aloud and here are a few inside tips; have fun and show them your love for reading, use character voices (be loud, be quiet, be sad, be gruff), set the atmosphere such as dimming the lights, get under the blankets or make it spooky, let children hold puppets of characters in the story and talk about what you want to know or already know about the book, the author and any details about how you used to read this book when you were a child. ## Health Information

### Gastroenteritis

There has been several cases of Gastroenteritis across the school. Information about gastroenteritis is provided to us from ACT Health and all families/staff are required to follow their guidelines. If your child has vomiting and diarrhoea, it is recommended that they stay away from school until at least 48 hours after the symptoms have stopped.

The most effective way of preventing spread of Gastroenteritis is to stay away from unnecessary contact with others and practise good hand washing. This is achieved by washing hands thoroughly using soap and running water for at least 10 seconds, followed by drying hands.

### Health

Children should not attend school when unwell. The most important way to break the chain of infection and stop spread of diseases are exclusion of ill children, educators and other staff. Your family doctor or the school can provide information regarding recommended exclusion periods for illnesses. Following these guidelines helps prevent contagious illnesses spreading to other children and staff.

### Volume 5: Positive Recognition Systems: Rewards

**What is a positive reward and how does it fit within Wellbeing @ Macgregor and the philosophy of Positive Behaviours for Learning?**

Positive rewards are ways we can recognise individuals and the behaviour that we want to see in our classes. They are compatible with the theory of Positive Behaviour for Learning when they are used to teach the desired behaviour that we want to see.

#### **What do we know?**

Tangible rewards are effective when used:

- to build new skills or sustain desired skills,
- with contingent delivery of rewards for specific behaviour,
- and gradually faded over time.

#### **Tokens, W@M bands and certificates.**

The token is the agreed upon method of rewarding students who have shown the positive behaviours at Macgregor Primary School and should be recorded as part of the W@M points tallies for the week. Most students will respond to these systems and that is what the school leadership team and teaching team encourage.

#### **What rewards can we use outside the token system at Macgregor Primary?**

We know that all students are individuals and that sometimes backgrounds, trauma and other special circumstances require a more individualised approach. To make it easier for teaching staff, the guidelines for any individual rewards were discussed at a recent staff meeting and the following are designed to help craft a reward that will promote positive behaviours in class:

- A W@M token is the best way of rewarding the values that we want to see in classes and on the playground
- Any reward (including tokens) should be explicitly linked to the W@M values or BRICK values or the learning that has taken place.
- The student should know exactly why they are being positively reinforced.
- All rewards should take place in the classroom or under supervision.
- Our shared *duty of care* for the student is our overriding responsibility.
- Rewards should exist only to build a positive relationship between the teacher and the student
- Rewards should focus on the student being rewarded and not their friends
- Learning time should be protected and any rewards that require time should take place in the student's time as much as possible.
- Depth and extension of student's passion work is preferable to time away from classwork.
- Rewards should have a structure that is easy to understand and can be followed by relief teachers or new teachers taking over the class with little disruption.

## Community Announcements

### PRESCHOOL 2020

If you have a child who turns 4 on or before 30 April 2020, then he/she is eligible to begin Preschool in February 2020.

Round 1 preschool enrolments opened online on Monday 29 April 2019 at 6:00 am. Round 1 enrolments will **close on Friday 7 June** at 5:00pm. Round 2 enrolment applications commence at 5:01pm on Friday 7 June 2019.

2019 pre-schoolers who live in area (Macgregor) or have siblings who attend Macgregor Primary School, will automatically continue their enrolment into Kindergarten for 2020 at Macgregor Primary School. Families do **NOT** need to complete an online enrolment form.

## Hats Off Day - The end of May

### Sun Protection for Students

- In Canberra sun protection is required for part or most of each day between August and May. The end of May is 'Hats Off Day' whilst the beginning of August is 'Hats On Again' for all of us.
- Due to low (under 3) daily UV levels experienced in Canberra from June to July, ACT schools will not be required to enforce sun UV protection in this period. However sensible sun UV protection may still be warranted if spending extended period outdoors during these months i.e. at all day outdoor sporting events and excursions.
- Between August and May students and workers are required to wear SunSmart hats (e.g.: broad-brimmed, bucket with deep crown or legionnaire hats) that cover the face, ears and neck.
- Students with no hat will be required to play in a well shaded area. This is informally known as 'No Hat Play in the Shade'.
- Sunhat cords can become caught and a risk to children playing on fixed playground equipment. Schools must request that parents either purchase sun hats with safety cords designed to break under minimal strain, or remove cords from sunhats altogether.
- Schools are required to make sunscreen accessible to all students and workers for daily applications throughout the day. Schools have sunscreen in most, if not all classrooms. Students are encouraged to apply sunscreen themselves. Staff will exercise judgment as to whether some students, for example, younger children, should be supervised or assisted when applying sunscreen.
- Parents/carers should inform the school if they do not wish workers to apply sunscreen to their children. If a child is allergic to sunscreen, parents/carers must notify the school about this on the medical form completed at the beginning of each school year. Parents/carers have the option of providing a hypoallergenic sunscreen for their children.

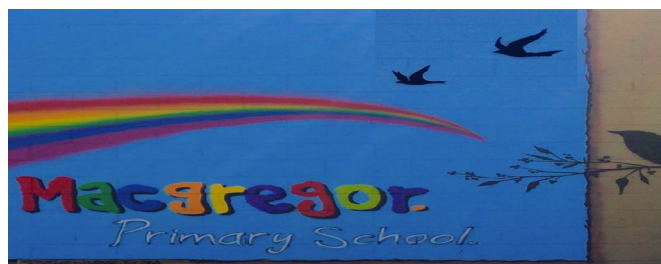
We always look forward to students coming along and welcome any questions from anyone wanting to commence with school banking. School banking is also open to preschool students and also younger siblings of school students.
